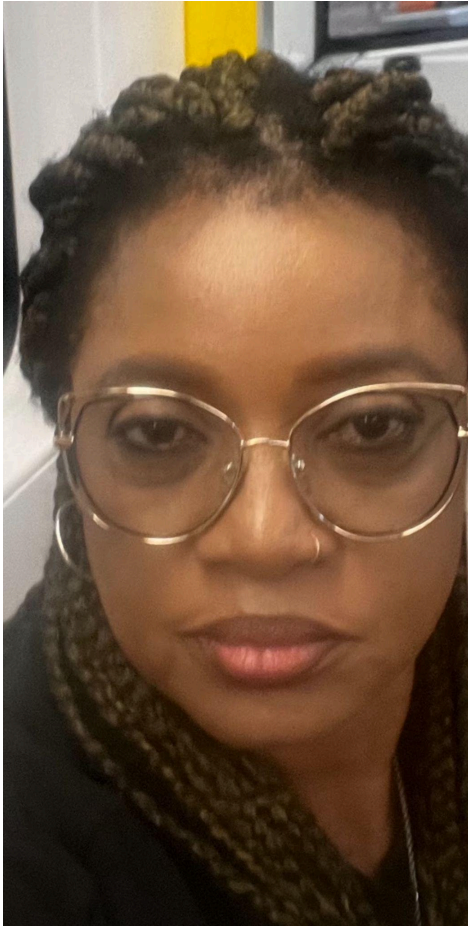


Angella Foster

She served on National Domestic Workers Alliance's Nanny Council, a leader with We Dream In Black, an affiliate of the NDWA, a Massachusetts Service Alliance Alum and a member of Supermajority, an organization that affirms and builds women's power.

She has been honored to speak at the 2014 signing of the Massachusetts Domestic Worker Bill of Rights and have been featured in various media outlets, including The Boston Globe and The New York Times, through her involvement in initiatives such as the 2016 Nanny Census and the 2019 Matahari Nanny Camera Campaign.

She dedicated her time and efforts to Matahari Women Workers Center for over ten years, advocating for immigrant women, domestic workers, and women of color. She worked tirelessly in the field, reaching out to communities, building relationships, and strategizing for campaigns to bring about positive change and equality for these marginalized groups.
